



## Education ReStart Turner Plan Overview

Category	Phase 3
General	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Schools are currently open at 50% capacity for student instruction and activities. We are constantly reviewing case data with the Wyandotte County Health Department and will increase in-person learning as soon as allowed.</li></ul>
Blended Learning Option	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>To remain compliant with Kansas compulsory attendance requirements, students are required to participate in either "Blended Learning" or "Remote Learning" (see next section) education.</li><li>Students have been assigned to Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday classes with alternating Fridays.</li><li>Part-time enrollment is not permitted.</li><li>5<sup>th</sup> grade band will be postponed, beginning no earlier than January, 2021.</li></ul>
Remote Learning Option	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Students electing full Remote Learning are receiving a digital curriculum. Students at the elementary level have been assigned to a Remote Learning teacher who provide a combination of required "live" instruction as well as independent practice. Class selections at the secondary level are offered from a computerized program catalog. Secondary students are provided instructional support by a USD 202 staff member.</li><li>Part-time enrollment is not permitted.</li><li>Remote Learning students will not be eligible to participate in school activities/athletics.</li><li>The decision to enroll in Remote Learning will be maintained through the first semester, which ends January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2020. In the upcoming weeks, families will be able to submit preferences for the second semester. Until that time, we will not consider requests to move to an in-person model.</li></ul>
Physical Distancing	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Elementary students may travel as a class to specials (Art, Music, Physical Education).</li><li>Certain classes, such as physical education and music, may operate outside as reasonably possible.</li><li>Individual classrooms at all levels are operating as cohorts and have limited interaction with other classroom cohorts. At the secondary level, this means that students are not rotating between classes.</li><li>Student seating is spaced as much as possible and desks will be forward-facing.</li><li>Large group meetings (more than 45 people) will occur virtually.</li><li>Social/community events (Back-to-School night, etc) that include more than 45 non-students will occur virtually.</li><li>Traditional holiday parties that co-mingle classrooms (Halloween, etc) will not occur as they regularly do. Cohorts will plan for a socially distanced party or activity that occurs within the classroom. No outside visitors will be allowed.</li><li>Students will have assigned seating on school buses.</li><li>Parent-teacher conferences will occur virtually for most families. Teachers will distribute a link to a scheduled Microsoft Teams meeting. Parents who wish to have an in-person conference will be accommodated to the best of our ability.</li></ul>
Meal Preparation & Service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Additional meal periods may occur to provide social distancing.</li><li>Most students will eat breakfast and lunch in classrooms.</li><li>Breakfasts are distributed as students enter the building.</li><li>Students may also eat outside safely.</li><li>No student self-serve buffet items are offered.</li><li>"Second chance" breakfast will not be offered.</li><li>All staff wash hands before and after meal preparation and feeding.</li><li>Lunch guests will not be allowed.</li></ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All students qualify for a free breakfast and lunch as long as State/Federal funding is in place; hopefully through December 31, 2020. Meals for Remote Learners and Blended Learners on their at-home days are available on a pick-up basis.</li> </ul>
Hygiene	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Students will bring and use personal water bottles.</li> <li>Drinking fountains are not available. Bottle fillers are available for use.</li> <li>Restroom breaks and hall passes will be scheduled and monitored.</li> <li>Staff and children wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds (or use hand sanitizer) hourly, particularly upon arrival, before and after eating, using the restroom, before and after playing outdoors or using shared spaces, following any contact with bodily fluid, and before exiting the building.</li> <li>Encourage children to not touch hands to eyes, nose or mouths as much as possible.</li> <li>Student school supplies are for individual use only and are not to be shared.</li> <li>Student lockers will not be available for use.</li> <li>Hand sanitizer is present in all classrooms.</li> </ul>
Cleaning	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Surfaces/classrooms are disinfected each evening using EPA-registered disinfectants.</li> <li>Staff disinfect high-touch surfaces, such as door handles, desks, light switches, faucets, toilet seats routinely.</li> <li>Equipment used in schools is not shared and is cleaned between uses.</li> <li>Materials that cannot be washed are not used.</li> <li>Disinfect busses daily.</li> </ul>
Personal Protective Equipment	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Masks/face coverings are required for all individuals. All individuals should bring their own personal mask to school.</li> <li>Staff or students who are unable to wear a mask due to a reason cited in the Kansas mask/face covering Order will be offered a clear face shield.</li> <li>Staff/students will have access to hand sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol) and disposable gloves and use them as needed.</li> <li>Staff will wear smocks or gowns when providing direct care or when in physical contact with children with special needs.</li> <li>Flu shots will be available for free to all students and staff on October 21st from 2:00-6:00 at TRC. More information will be released shortly.</li> </ul>
Symptom Screening and Response	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Screen students, employees, and visitors for fever and symptoms of COVID-19 with a questionnaire and temperature check.</li> <li>Employees who indicate symptoms on the screening or who have a temperature of 100.4 or higher should not report to work and will contact their supervisor. Employees who start to experience symptoms during the day will be referred to the school nurse who will refer the employee for COVID-19 testing at the Wyandotte County Health Department. While awaiting results, the employee must isolate at home. If negative, the employee should return to work after their symptoms resolve. If positive, they should stay isolated for 10 days past the onset of symptoms or until they are fever free for 72 hours, whichever is longer.</li> <li>Employees and students with COVID-19 symptoms should be denied entry to the school and should be sent promptly for COVID-19 testing at the Wyandotte County Health Department or their primary care physician's office. Clinical symptom criteria is at least one of the following: fever, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, OR at least two of the following symptoms: chills, stiffness or rigidity, muscle aches or pain, headache, sore throat, changes in smell or taste, stomach or abdominal pain/vomiting/diarrhea.</li> <li>Children who start to experience symptoms of respiratory illness, including a fever of 100.4° F or above and symptoms of other infectious illnesses while at school will be sent home immediately. While waiting to be picked up, the student will be isolated from other children. They will be referred for COVID-19 testing at the Wyandotte County Health Department. While awaiting test results, the student must isolate at home. If negative, the student should return to school after</li> </ul>

	<p>their symptoms resolve. If positive, they should stay isolated for 10 days past the onset of symptoms or until they are fever free for 72 hours, whichever is longer.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>When there is confirmation that a person infected with COVID-19 was in a school building, the school will contact the local health department immediately. As one option, the school may close the individual classroom or the school building for a minimum of two to five days and work with the local health department to assess factors, such as the likelihood of exposure to employees and students in the building, the number of cases in the community and other factors that will determine when the classroom or building should reopen. If the school building is closed, all school activities will be cancelled or rescheduled, regardless of whether the activity was to take place in the building or another location, including extracurricular activities, before and after-school programs and field trips. Parents/students and employees will be encouraged to stay at home until more information is provided by the school or the health department.</li><li>As another option, the school may remain open but block off areas where the person infected with COVID-19 was in the school building until the area has been cleaned thoroughly. The school should work with the local health department to assess for close contacts between students and staff and inform those who are exposed that they must start a mandatory 14-day quarantine period.</li><li>The school will contact parents/students and employees and notify them that a person who tested positive for COVID-19 was in the building and encourage cooperation with the school and the local health department to trace contacts with the individual. The individual who tested positive will not be identified in communications to the school community at large.</li></ul>
